Because of your dedication, hard work, persistence and prayers 2018 was an amazing year of challenge and change! Here are a few highlights:

- Initiated a comprehensive transformation program and engaged in conversations to explore who we are, who are our neighbors and what God is calling us to do
- Broke with recent past practice and celebrated worship at 8:30 and 10 through the summer,
- Advanced multimedia presentation in the 10am worship service,
- Activated an intensive study of our ministry around Hunger Action
- Explored team-based ministry, ways to simplify our structure, and how to balance our budget
- Reduced our carbon footprint by completing the solar panel project,
- Upgraded the deck at Selah and the elevator and
- Took the Fales Street building down

Each week people share how uplifting our worship is and how excited they are about the future of GPC. The “Love One Another” stewardship campaign engage twice as many people and garnered triple the pledges over the prior year! Testaments to the positive spirit and commitment to strengthen our ministry.

In the year ahead, we have much to do. Finances will remain tight as we live within a balanced budget; Team TLC will lead us through a process to discern God’s vision and mission for GPC; and greater emphasis will be placed on deepening relationships with people in our surrounding community and intentional, impactful mission and ministry.

Although adoption of the proposed restructuring will usher in a new era for our ministry, it will take time to transition from the old structure to the new, clarify the roles, unlearn what was and learn how to be community in these new ways. Collectively we will be called to listen deeply, express grace, and “make the road by walking it.”

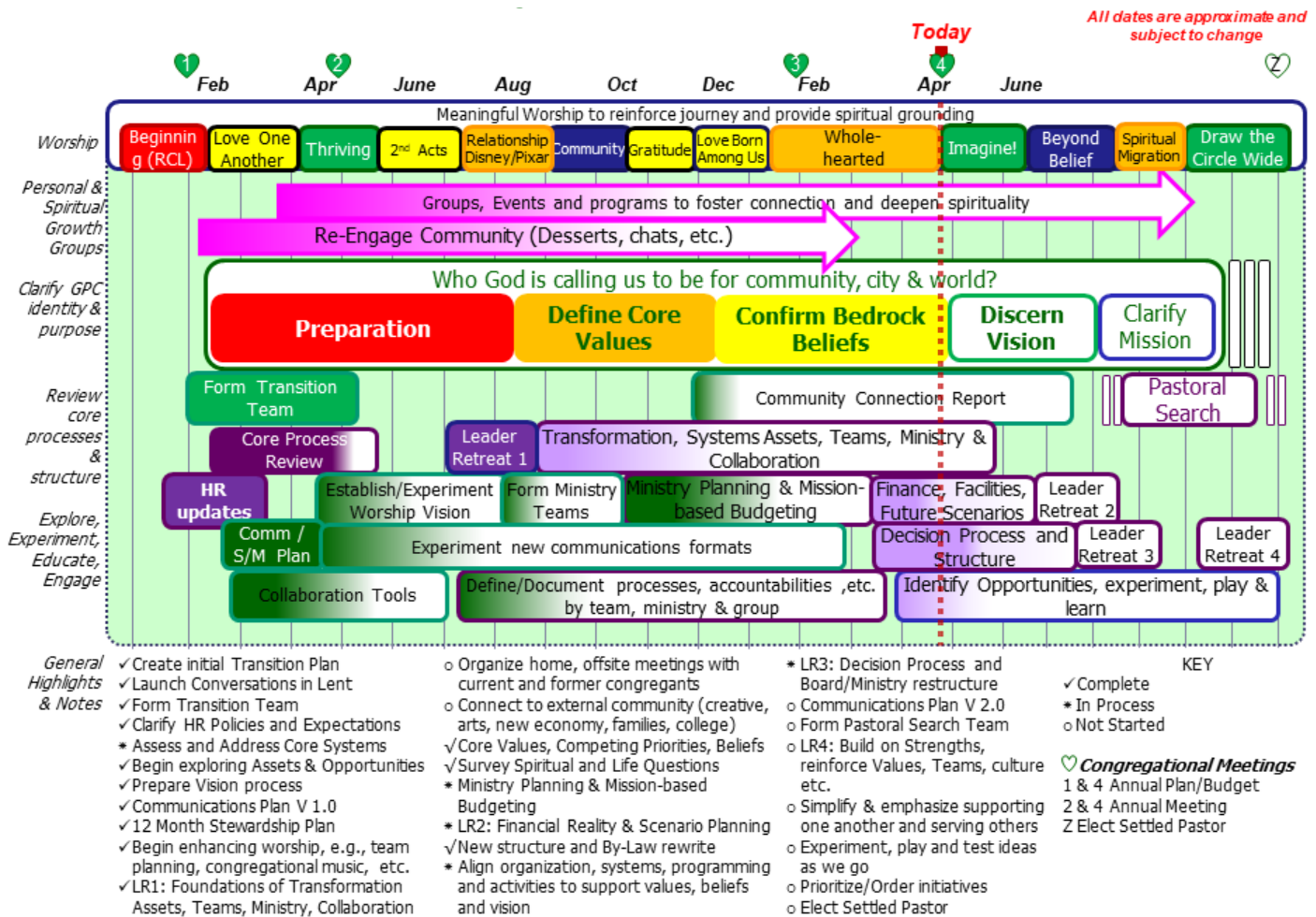

IV. Care, Prayer & Serving Others

The board of deacons, known as the diaconate, at Greendale People's Church, is responsible for the oversight of the spiritual life for the church and church members, providing assistance to the pastor in promoting a meaningful worship service and experience. The deacons assist in the preparation of the chapel and sanctuary for Sunday and special services throughout the liturgical year. This responsibility includes the preparation of communion, collection of tithes, and baptisms (as required). The diaconate also helps to set priorities and provide leadership in the church's local, national, and international missions and programs. Locally, the diaconate ensures that lunch is provided for Worcester Fellowship in downtown Worcester during the year. The deacons led or supported the following during the past year.

- Annual turkey shoot, which provided 37 holiday baskets for Rainbow Child Center and 13 baskets to our food pantry participants.
- The Angel Tree, providing gifts for Rainbow Child Center.
- Prepared a warm meal and served 75-100 people each month for Mustard Seed
- Prepared a warm meal and served 50 people for the LGBT Asylum Seekers Task Force
- Prepared and distributed 300 bagged lunches annually for Worcester Fellowship
- Greendale People's Church Care Ministry
- Veteran's Inc.
- 40 for 40 Food Program

V. Personal & Spiritual Growth

Christian Education Accomplishments

1. Worked closely with the Cana Community Church (CCC) Sunday School Leader to choose an age appropriate Sunday School curriculum that fits the model and inclusivity of both CCC and Greendale People's Church.
2. The CCC was able to secure additional volunteer helpers for Sunday School classroom education and teacher assistance.
3. The CCC and GPC Sunday School Leaders worked with the Pastors to help define their needs and what they're required for support to effectively teach (i.e. age/grade criteria for youth in class, additional education supplies).
4. Collaborated with the CCC to implement and carry out the ongoing Care Ministry Program for our community.
5. The GPC Sunday School Leader worked closely with the Pastor to help define the support and requirements needed to carry out an effective Sunday School classroom, Children's Sunday, special events, parent meetings

Christian Education Goals

1. As young members of the church, continue to have the children visible in Worship (i.e. readings, tithing, music, working with Deacons)
2. Enhance classroom education by purchasing more craft supplies, games, creating an engaging atmosphere where the children learn spiritually through fun and want to be in church
3. Continue to ask GPC members to volunteer in classroom help and or teach
4. Look into soundproofing the Genesis classroom/having the GPC Custodian hang the soundproof squares
5. Look into a remnant rug to soundproof the Genesis room
6. Paint the classroom hallway (ask for Youth Group volunteers, teachers, church members)
7. Work with Pastor to hold a meeting with GPC Parents and hold an educational session with outside Educators to work with parents and teachers.

VI. Nurturing Community

Special Projects Team's Annual Report for the 2018 - 2019 program year.

Purpose: The main focus of the Special Projects Team is to conduct the fundraising of the church through social events and service to the community through events to provide and encourage fellowship and Christian Spirit in the congregation and the wider community.

Accomplishments in 2018:

- a) Provided a Holiday Fair in early November, 2018, that brought hundreds of Worcester community residents into our church to view and purchase items from the seventeen (17) different venues located throughout the church facility. The Fair raised \$12,504 during the two-day event; the amount includes the Turkey Dinner income of \$1,955, which served 168 dinners. A related event raised an additional \$725 in Advent Wreath sales; and, another \$200 in Fair leftovers of food and crafts.
- b) The Team hosted other fundraisers such as the Valentine Cookie Walk, which raised \$456, and the annual Soup Fest, which raised \$450 to help with the church budget.
- c) The Team sponsors church community events such as the Everybody's Birthday Party and helps Chefs Claude and Mike in Fisher Hall set-up and serving of the Lenten meals on Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday.

Goals for 2019:

- a) Continue our social events, outreach, awareness, and service to the community through the Annual Holiday Fair.
- b) Continue fundraising events to support the church operating budget.
- c) Continue providing opportunities and venues to enhance Fellowship among our Congregation.

Future Events:

We plan on a new event in May called a Post Celebration of the Kentucky Derby for a mini-fundraiser. There will also be an Everybody's Birthday Party Celebration in May.

THANK YOU to all who contribute and donate time, talents, and treasure to make the Holiday Fair a huge community awareness event and primary fundraiser through providing the many varied venues. And, for all fellowship shared in providing the sponsored events throughout the year.

The strength, kindness and stories of many PROTO ladies past and current are amazing!

VII. Pastor Parish Relations

Pastor Parish Relations serves as advocate for the pastor in all areas of church life and as an additional way congregants can proactively share their thoughts and concerns. The team includes David Raphael, Kim Paré, Dennis O'Malley and Rev. Dr. Kevin Downer.

The PPR Team generally meets quarterly and/or as needed.

- The PPR met twice since the last annual meeting (7/1/18, 3/10/19)
- People like what Rev Kev has brought to both services especially his thoughtful sermons and passionate delivery. There's been nothing but positive comments that Kev is out from behind the pulpit/on the floor and welcoming all to the communion table.
- There have been a few comments regarding the challenges and adjustment to some of the "new" music during second service.
- PPR is open to all commentary regarding the changes to the by-laws and the governance restructuring.
- Rev Kev's initial covenant (18 months) has been extended for 12 months through June 2020 to give GPC time to complete the vision work and restructuring.
- Pastoral search can be initiated after the Vision work is completed.
- The Moderator, Anne Kruse and Vice Moderator David Raphael completed an annual review for Rev Kev in Nov 2018.
- In the coming year, PPR plans to meet quarterly should pressing items arise.

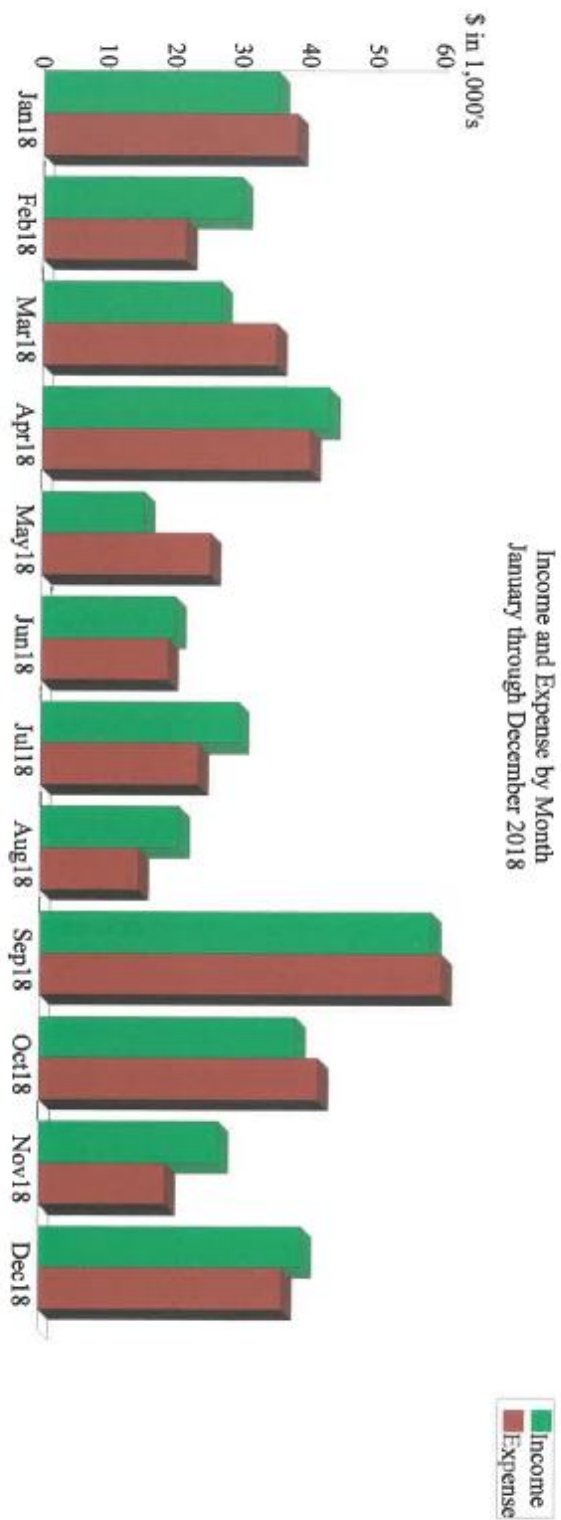

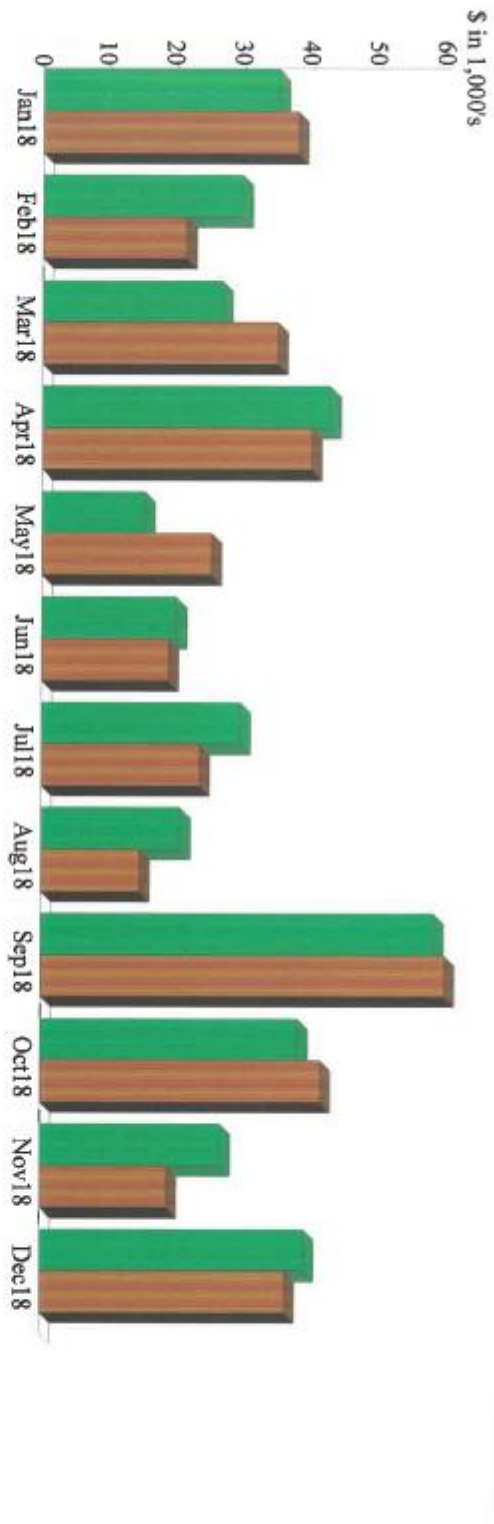
Income Summary
January through December 2018



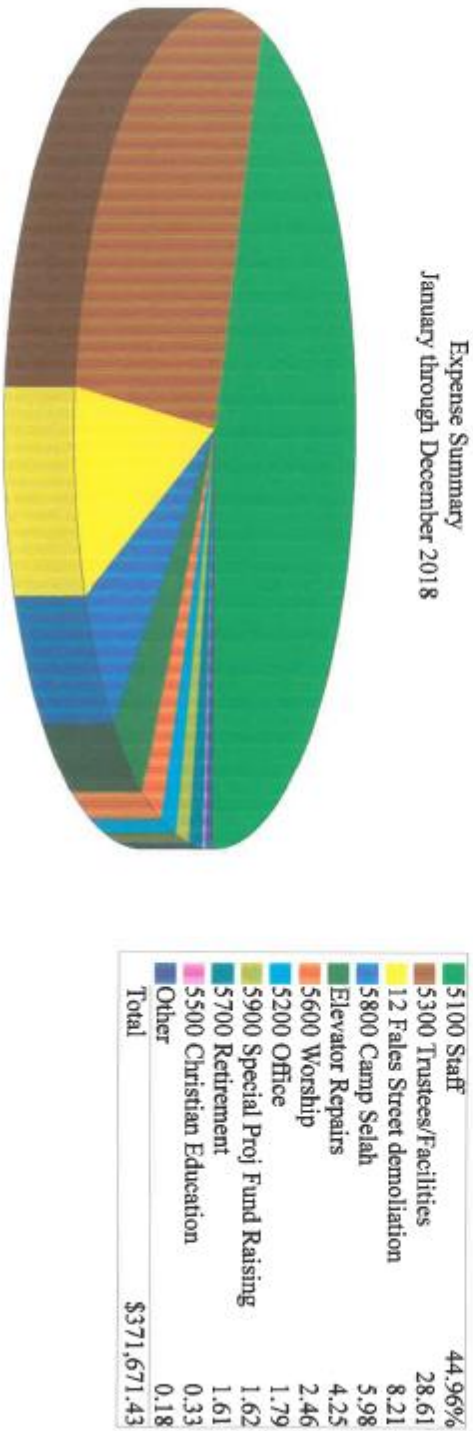

Plan & Budget Notes January 1- March 31, 2019

Income-Total income is 2% above budget as of the first quarter.

- General Offering is 6% less than budget
- Building Income is 9% less than budget
- The \$20,000 investment income budgeted for the year was withdrawn in the first quarter to meet unbudgeted expenses
- Giving for Mustard Seed and the Food Pantry has exceeded budget in the first quarter

Expenses-Total expenses are 13% above budget in the first quarter.

- Due to an error, staff expenses were 4% above budget
- Due to a number of unbudgeted expenses incurred in the first quarter, facility expenses were 36% (\$8,704) above budget
- All other expenses categories are within the budget plan

Other Items

Because of the unbudgeted expenses noted above, an additional \$15,000 was withdrawn from the endowment. These funds and any additional funds withdrawn must be returned to the endowment prior to year-end to maintain a balanced budget.

- The team met on a monthly basis rather than just in the fall for the Declaration of Intentions Campaign.

- Start an Annual Appreciation Event for all supporters of the church financially, with talents and/or time commitments.
- Sponsor a program for members to find and develop their spiritual gifts.
- Develop a Stewardship Brochure.
- Develop and rollout the Declaration of Intention plan for 2019 so that it exceeds the one in 2018.
